News from the Reference & Adult Services Division

To Serve and Protect

What situations make you feel most ill at ease, and what can you do to ensure your patrons' safety as well as your own? Over 50 individuals seeking answers to these questions attended the RASD program, To Serve and Protect: The Do's and Don'ts of Personal and Patron Safety, on April 11, 2007, at NLS.

The guest speaker was Detective Fred Fusswinkel, Vice President of the New York State Crime Prevention Coalition. Detective Fusswinkel suggested ways that library workers can identify potentially difficult situations using a workplace checklist and a variety of ways to approach them. He also strongly urged that those who feel they are in danger should not hesitate to call their local police. Following the break, the detective gave an overview of the new Violence in the Workplace law, and discussed the link between workplace and domestic violence. Websites that provided information about workplace safety were also discussed.

RASD Long Island Library Conference Program Is "Popular"

Look! On the shelves of your library! It's frivolous and serious! It's literary and trashy! It's "popular culture!" According to librarians and "pop mavens" Sophie Brookover and Elizabeth Burns, hip-hop, therefore, is just as legitimate a subject for inclusion in a library's collection as opera.

That's what more than 100 librarians, directors, trustees and program coordinators came to learn from Brookover and Burns during their presentation, Pop Goes the Library: Using Popular Culture to Connect With Your Whole Community," at this year's Conference. As Brookover and Burns explained, "Popular culture is whatever people in your community are talking, thinking, and reading about."

Brookover, YA librarian, Camden County Library, and Burns, Branch Manager, Waretown Branch of the Ocean County Library, discussed ways to find out what's "hot" and how to use this information to build your collection, market it, and create programs for all ages around it. For example, if the news is focusing on Madonna adopting a baby from Malawi and people are talking about it, be sure you have books and other materials on international adoption and put them on display.

If interest warrants it, book a program on the subject as well. By responding to your community's wants, in addition to their needs, they said, you've not only put out a lure to current and potential library users, you've also made your library indispensable. The Media Services Division will present a program on Tuesday, June 19, 2007, at the Nassau Library System on "Digitization in Libraries."

Donald E. Wilson, Director of C.W. Post School Library Media Program, Wins 2007 LDA Award

Donald E. Wilson, director of the School Library Media Program at the C.W. Post Campus of Long Island University, was named the 2007 winner of the LDA Award at this year's Long Island Library Conference.

A selection committee appointed by the Nassau County Library Association and the Suffolk County Library Association noted Wilson's service to the library community as a school librarian, professor of library science and program director at the Palmer School of Library and Information Science at C.W. Post.

"The committee took special cognizance of the work that this quiet, unassuming leader has done to improve the stature and activities of a number of local, statewide and national library organizations," said Arthur Friedman, chairman of the Directory Committee of the Nassau County Library Association. "For more than 40 years, Don Wilson has been an

effective librarian, educator extraordinaire, and mentor to colleagues throughout the profession. Fortunately, he shows no signs of slowing down or giving up the tasks that he loves so well."

The LDA Award was created in 1978 by Andrew Ippolito, founder of LDA Publishers Inc., to call attention to the importance of libraries and library people on Long Island. Annually an individual is selected who has enriched the field of librarianship. Librarians, trustees, support staff, friends of the library, vendors and publishers are all eligible.

Wilson joined the faculty of the Palmer School as an adjunct in 1988. He has been a full time school media specialist in the Island Trees School District in Levittown, N.Y. since 1967, where he was at the center of a 1982 censorship controversy in which the U.S. Supreme Court limited the power of school boards to remove books they considered offensive from school libraries. Wilson has been a part-time public librarian at numerous libraries in Nassau and Suffolk counties.

His interests are bibliotherapy for children, the literature of the Holocaust and tolerance and Native American literature for children and young adults, especially Long Island Native American themes, legends, people and history.

Wilson is also a member of the Society for Children's Book Writers and Illustrators. He is a professor at the Palmer School of Library and Information Science, a division of the College of Information and Computer Science at the C.W. Post Campus of Long Island University.

On behalf of LDA Publishers and the Nassau and Suffolk County Library Associations, I want to acknowledge and thank the members of this year's bi-county award committee for their diligence and the quality of their selection. The committee was co-chaired by Paula Bornstein of the Lindenhurst Memorial Library and Kenneth Bellafiore of Nassau Community College

The description of the LDA Award for Excellence in Library Achievement and the list of previous distinguished award winners may be found in the Directory of Long Island Libraries

and Media Centers. Therefore, I won't repeat them now.

As Editor-in-chief of the Directory, I have, once again, been given the honor of introducing the individual whose résumé of service and dedication to librarianship -- spanning a wide variety of duties and achievements, made a distinct impression on the selection committee.

Recognizing individuals who serve as role models in librarianship is one of the most important tasks that our community can perform. While many opportunities exist for individuals to provide service to libraries and our associations, few are willing to accept the challenges and the commitment that is involved.

In the few minutes that I have been given this morning, I only have time to highlight some of the characteristics and accomplishments of the 2007 honoree's distinguished service in the advancement of library services and the ideals of Librarianship.

The nominators noted this individual's service to the library community in multiple arenas. As a school librarian, and library science faculty member, today's honoree has had a history of working with children and young adults, and by exploring themes such as the scope of Native American Literature, Literature of the Holocaust and Tolerance, and Bibliotherapy with them, this individual has helped them see how books can enhance their lives and experience the diversity and richness around them.

I am sure that the Committee took special cognizance of the work that this quiet, unassuming leader did to improve the stature and activities of a number of local, statewide and national library organizations. I am sure that we all want to hear how

this lifelong Catholic rejuvenated the Long Island Association of Jewish Libraries, developed its programming and brought it into the network of library organizations! A long-time activist in the New York State School Library Media Association, and coordinator of its Long Island chapter, in 2005, this leader brought the Association to Long Island for one of the biggest and finest conferences it ever held. It was so successful that they almost ran out of seats and spaces as a large contingent of last moment registrants came to the event. When it was over people marveled at how calmly and almost effortlessly this individual handled the tasks.

In 1982, the Long Island library community was faced with a severe incidence of school censorship – the famous case of Pico v Island Trees. While not directly impacted by the case, today's LDA award winner was involved in "rallying the troops" for the cause. A lifelong champion of the right to read and unfettered access to materials, it doesn't take much to get this individual to develop a program or give a presentation honoring the principle we all endorse.

Let me offer a few of the comments that surfaced in the letters of nomination for this outstanding individual:

"As a faculty member at the Palmer School, he instills in students the same pride and zest for our profession that he himself holds."

"He is a true professional who continually educates new and seasoned librarians and continues to learn himself."

Steven Pico wrote: "He was a leader in the fight for free expression because it was necessary, and not with any other motivation."

A student described how "His enthusiasm and love for every aspect of library science, research and literature provided her with a change of heart." This cemented her desire to be a children's librarian.

For more than 40 years, today's honoree has been an effective librarian, educator extraordinaire, and mentor to colleagues throughout the profession. However, he shows no signs of slowing down or giving up the tasks that he loves so well!

Let me close with the following: Whether you call him Professor, friend, colleague, trainer, children's workshop performer, advocate, or member of a library association committee, Donald Wilson has made a significant impact on many of our institutions and many of us in the library profession. His commitment to library service has directly benefited patrons and library staff throughout the Long Island community. Indeed, throughout New York State and our Nation!

Friends, colleagues, honored guests, I am proud to present the distinguished recipient of the 2007 LDA Award for Excellence in Library Achievement, a longtime friend and colleague,

Report from the Institutional Services Committee Mercy First School

The Nassau County Library Association's Institutional Services Committee is actively involved in supporting literacy efforts at the Mercy First School (formerly St. Mary's School). They are from all nationalities and religions, have had adjustment problems, and are receiving a vast range of services.

Traditional Chinese Medicine & Psychiatric Diagnosis

Mr. Nash is also an adjunct faculty member at Lehman College, City University of New York and at New York University.

In addition, Ms. Mona Wasserman, Director of Library & Information Services at the New York College of Health Professions, presented information on consumer level resources for alternative health information.



Farewell to the New York State Newspaper Project

The New York State Newspaper Project, located at the New York State Library, ceased operation on January 31, 2007, after almost twenty years locating, cataloging, and preserving New York State newspapers. The Project was responsible for filming over 4.37 million pages of New York State newspapers.

As part of the United States Newspaper Program (USNP), and funded in part by the National Endowment for the Humanities, Project staff inventoried 1,759 newspaper repositories, cataloged 22,785 distinct newspaper titles, with 10,537 of those published in New York State, and created 66,065 local holdings records with issue-specific data. Newspapers were microfilmed and added to the State Library's collection, making the papers available on-site to patrons and available through interlibrary loan. A copy of the film was also provided at no cost to the institution loaning the newspapers.

Thanks to the hard work and dedication of staff members over the years, access to once unknown New York newspaper collections, and the rich history of the state uniquely told in their pages, is available today.
